Workshop

Current ecological disasters, together with economic, social, and political crisis at both global and local levels, are forcing us to seriously consider how strongly related we humans are, each other, as well as with animals, plants, but also rocks, meteorological events, and other forces. In the past decades, new anthropological theories have delved into this human-non-human relationality, highlighting the different epistemologies and ontologies through which people produce different “more-than-human” worlds.

This workshop intends to initiate a conversation that takes these epistemological/ontological frictions seriously and discusses them from a comparative perspective. Through the presentation and discussion of ethnographic research papers, the workshop aims to address different modulations of the more-than-human worlds, through perspectives interested in rituals, mutual rearing, coexistence, and frictions in mountain areas and beyond.
