Specific educational objectives	<p>The course refers to the typical educational activities and belongs to the scientific area of statistics.</p> <p>This course introduces a wide range of statistical tools for making inferences and predictions from data, including regression, classification, supervised methods and unsupervised methods. All the methods covered in class are illustrated using real data sets commonly found in business and finance. within the R statistical computing environment.</p> <p>At the end of the course, the students will be able to select and use properly a wide range of statistical learning and forecasting tools. They will be also able to draw conclusions from their analyses in the context of real data.</p>
