List of topics covered	Community development is a central strand of social work methodology besides case work and group work. At the same time it has a symbolic significance for all methods of social work in as much as it emphasises the general principles of social work under conditions of modernity: a) to foster the social dimension of life in societies by building community belonging and solidarity; b) to achieve this by building on the inherent strengths of people; c) to engage participants directly in a learning process that strengthens their confidence in problem-solving. This course will examine historically how 'community' came to be a social policy issue in the wake of the industrial revolution and what kind of versions of 'community' developed within different political cultures of Europe. Community development has not only the goal of operating within those given parameters but also to question them critically and to enable citizens, and particularly people who

	have been relegated to marginal positions in society, to make a constructive contribution to community building.
