objectives	<ul> <li>This specifically designed course aims to continue developing students' proficiency in using academic English for their master's studies in eco-social design and follows on from the English MA 1 course.</li> <li>It covers the main areas of scientific and academic communication that master students will encounter to assist them in the linguistic aspects of their research.</li> <li>Specific educational objectives include the following: <ul> <li>to improve academic and scientific written skills through practice of subject-specific texts;</li> <li>to improve spoken interaction and production through the practice and production of academic scientific presentations;</li> <li>to improve receptive skills through the exposure to and analysis of various types of written and spoken discourse;</li> <li>to develop grammatical and lexical range and accuracy so that communication has a good degree of spontaneity and fluency.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Office hours List of topics covered	<ul> <li>tba</li> <li>Topics covered include a consolidation of more complex grammatical structures used in this field and at this level through use of practical applications. Other topics include: <ul> <li>how to write research papers including literature reviews, data collection and analysis, descriptions of methodologies/research design, presenting prevailing theories, presenting arguments;</li> <li>how to write references;</li> <li>how to write abstracts and proposals for papers;</li> <li>academic and domain-specific vocabulary acquisition and word-building techniques; lexicogrammar;</li> <li>how to prepare and give scientific and/or academic presentations, including poster presentations.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Emphasis is placed on improving the four main skills (reading, writing, listening and speaking) through practical, communicative tasks.</li> </ul>
Teaching format	Teaching format is based on the seminar format which envisages teacher and student co-operation and participation in the classroom through individual, pair and group work.

Expected learning outcomes	• <u>Knowledge and understanding:</u> Knowledge of advanced grammatical structures and subject-specific academic and professional lexis at the C1 level, understanding of authentic (general and subject-specific) longer spoken and written texts including specialised texts and other texts produced for various purposes and representing different varieties of English, as well as different registers and styles.
	<ul> <li><u>Applying knowledge and understanding</u>: Producing specific academic texts related to the field of research providing opinions and accounting for the views presented. Presenting clear descriptions, analysis and evaluation of specific fields, developing</li> </ul>

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	points and formulating opinions in written and oral texts.
•	<u>Making judgments:</u> Integrating knowledge and understanding acquired in the course with knowledge and understanding from other courses to achieve academic and professional purposes within the fields of the master design course followed.
•	<u>Communication skills:</u> Communicating (in both speaking and writing) flexibly and effectively with a degree of fluency. Ability to adapt language style to show awareness of both the intended purposes and audience.
•	Learning skills: Ability to pursue autonomous learning based on the input provided in the classes and lectures and the feedback received.

Assessment	<ul> <li>Written exam: writing production task(s) of approx. 500 words based on subject-specific input and specific requirements of the master studies;</li> <li>Portfolio: writing tasks comprising the scientific and research texts covered in the course and based on authentic input (written and/or spoken);</li> <li>Oral exam: presentation of research and related Q&amp;A session demonstrating a C1 command of both spoken production and interaction.</li> </ul>
Assessment language	The same as the teaching language.
Evaluation criteria and criteria for awarding marks	50% final written exam, 35% oral exam, 15% Portfolio. Further details concerning the exam procedure will be provided during the course and online in the Reserve Collection for this course.
