<b>List of topics covered</b>	<p>The subject of the course is in constant evolution due to the fast commercialisation and internationalisation process of agricultural law. The course will focus particularly on Italian and European sources of agricultural law, as well as on the new sharing of responsibilities between national and regional government. The course will analyse the new definition of agricultural and fish-farm entrepreneur, the different types of entrepreneurs and the material structures agricultural entrepreneur work with. Attention will also be given to agricultural contracts. The concept of "geschlossener Hof" will be deepened.</p> <p>The course will cover the following topics:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. legal notion of agriculture and notion of agricultural law;</li> <li>2. the sources of agricultural law;</li> <li>3. EU agricultural law (selected issues)</li> <li>4. the agricultural entrepreneur and analogous roles;</li> <li>5. the farm;</li> <li>6. agricultural contracts</li> <li>7. the "closed farm" (geschlossener Hof)</li> <li>8. selected issues of environmental law</li> </ol>
<b>Teaching format</b>	Frontal lectures. Learning materials will be made available.
<b>Learning outcomes</b>	Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Demonstrate in-depth knowledge of fundamental principles of agricultural economics and policy (Knowing and Understanding).</li> <li>• Describe the basic concepts of consumer behaviour theory and to discuss them critically (Knowing, Understanding and Judging).</li> <li>• Be able to conduct independently simple agricultural policy analyses using market models (Applying).</li> <li>• Demonstrate knowledge of the sources of agricultural law and of main juridical subjects of agricultural law, with particular focus to the definitions of the agricultural entrepreneur, factory farm, agricultural contracts and the "geschlossener Hof" (Knowing, Understanding and Judging).</li> <li>• To describe the functioning of EU agricultural law and to critically discuss the market mechanisms as determined by law (knowledge, understanding and description).</li> </ul>
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<b>Assessment</b>	<p>The performance evaluation of the student consists of a written final exam (100% of the overall course mark).</p> <p>The written exam will last 240 (120+120) minutes and is made up of up to 10 (5+5) examination questions.</p>

<b>Evaluation criteria and criteria for awarding marks</b>	The written exam will be evaluated on the basis of the clarity of answers, the ability to summarize, evaluate and establish connections between topics.
