Learning outcomes for Module 2	Knowledge and understanding: Understanding of the necessity of social policy measures for the functioning of modern complex societies, knowledge of the origins, principles and major forms of social policy regimes including the modifications being implemented presently in various European contexts, knowledge of the basic social policy provisions in the Province of Südtirol Applying knowledge and understanding: Students will be expected to apply this theoretical knowledge to the major social provisions and services they will encounter as social workers. Making judgements: Based on the alternative models of "welfare regime positions" students will be able to assess in broad outline the consequences of current social policy trends for the well-being of service users and society as a whole.
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	Communication: Students will be able to present the knowledge acquired in seminar presentations on practice-relevant topics and communicate clearly the principles underlying the presented situations or service aspects. Lifelong learning skills: The knowledge and evaluation criteria learned in this module will enable students to locate their own life cycle and social protection needs within various framework conditions of social policy.
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Assessment	Seminar presentations with written documentation will be the principle basis for assessment, followed by an oral exam that covers major themes of the module
