Specific educational	Course description:
objectives	The planned seminar is of limited time concerning the broad and multi-faceted world it will introduce. As such, the course would open the essential points, aspects, and perspectives introducing the fashion and textile world, after which the students could further follow their tendencies and deepening their interests autonomously. The seminar is planned as a series of intensive engaging, vibrant and compact blocks, following the main themes as described in the tender and specified here below. The teaching blocks are a combination of frontal lectures, short impulse-lectures followed by various exercises, short theme-based workshops and hands-on work. Aiming to not only reflect on reality, but also gather first-hand experiences and understandings, the seminar integrates some short city excursions as well (fabric shops, local examples of fashion and fast-fashion and possibly a visit to the Saturday market for a 'reality check' and a real-life view on the speed and scope in which Haut Couture becomes market items).
