Specific educational objectives	This specifically designed course aims to develop students' proficiency in using academic English for their Master in Eco-Social Design.  It covers some of the main areas of scientific and academic communication that the Master's students will encounter to assist them in the linguistic aspects of their research.  Specific educational objectives include the following:  • to improve academic and scientific written skills through practice of subject-specific texts;  • to improve spoken interaction and production through the practice and production of academic presentations;  • to improve receptive skills, especially critical reading skills, through the exposure to and analysis of various types of written and spoken discourse;  • to develop grammatical and lexical range and accuracy so that communication has a good degree of spontaneity and fluency.

List of topics covered	Topics covered include a consolidation of more complex grammatical structures used in this field and at this level through use of practical applications. Other topics include:  • how to write research texts including descriptions of methodologies/research design, presenting prevailing theories, presenting arguments, evaluating processes, ideas and theories;  • how to reference other writers and work;  • how to write abstracts and proposals for papers;  • how to write the Transdisciplinary Meta-Reflection (TMR);  • academic and domain-specific vocabulary acquisition and word-building techniques; lexicogrammar;  • how to prepare and give scientific and/or academic presentations, including poster presentations and/or elevator speeches.  Emphasis is placed on improving the four main skills (reading, writing, listening and speaking) through practical, communicative tasks.
Teaching format	Teaching format is based on the seminar format which envisages teacher and student co-operation and participation in the classroom through individual, pair and group work.
Expected learning outcomes	Knowledge and understanding: Knowledge of advanced grammatical structures and subject-specific academic and professional lexis at the C1 level understanding of sutbentia (general and

## Knowledge and understanding: Knowledge of advanced grammatical structures and subject-specific academic and professional lexis at the C1 level, understanding of authentic (general and subject-specific) longer spoken and written texts including specialised texts and other texts produced for various purposes and representing different varieties of English, as well as different registers and styles. Applying knowledge and understanding: Producing specific academic texts related to the field of research providing opinions and accounting for the views presented. Presenting clear descriptions, analysis and evaluation of specific fields, developing points and formulating opinions in



	written and oral texts. Producing the TMR for the Transfolder.
	Making judgments: Integrating knowledge and understanding acquired in the course with knowledge and understanding from other courses to achieve academic and professional purposes within the fields of the master design course followed.
	<u>Communication skills:</u> Communicating (in both speaking and writing) flexibly and effectively with a degree of fluency. Ability to adapt language style to show awareness of both the intended purposes and audience.
	Learning skills: Ability to pursue autonomous learning based on the input provided in the classes and lectures and the feedback received.
Assessment	<ul> <li>Written exam: writing production task(s) of approx. 500 words based on subject-specific texts and specific requirements of the master's studies;</li> <li>TMR: production of the 450-550 word Transdisciplinary Meta-Reflection for the Transfolder;</li> <li>Oral exam: presentation of research and related Q&amp;A session demonstrating a C1 command of both spoken production and interaction.</li> </ul>
