Specific educational objectives:  List of topics covered:	The course offers an introduction to Italiot Greek (IG), i.e. two Modern Greek dialects spoken in Southern Italy. Aspects of the linguistic and sociolinguistic history of IG are explored, including the contemporary grammars of IG, diachronic change, language contact, typological comparisons, language endangerment.  The course aims at:  • offering a general overview of the past and present of the IG-speaking areas in Southern Italy from a sociolinguistic perspective  • providing basic knowledge of the IG grammar  • investigating the impact of language contact with Romance on language change at several levels of analysis (phonology, morphology, syntax)  • origins of IG  • cultural aspects  • language decline and revitalization  • language contact between IG and Romance  • diachronic change at several levels of analysis (phonology, morphology, syntax)  • typological comparisons between IG, Greek, and Romance
Teaching format:  Learning outcomes:	lectures, exercises in class (individual, in groups)  By the end of the seminar, the participants are expected to:  • have acquired fundamental knowledge of the language system of IG and be able to identify basic structures  • be able to reflect on how language contact with Romance has shaped the phonology, morphology, and syntax of contemporary IG and

	describe language change using adequate terminology  • be able to describe the sociolinguistic situtation in the IG-speaking enclaves  • think critically and communicate their ideas in a coherent and precise way
