Course description	The course belongs to the class "altro" in the curriculum in Design.  The seminar provides tools to plan, develop and edit your forthcoming internship, job, grant and postgraduate degree applications.  The seminar will especially focus on the written documents often required as part of an application, such as CV, resumé, cover letter, project proposal, and application forms. In addition, a lecture will be devoted to the preparation of oral interviews. The seminar is practice-based, but it will also include frontal lectures and guests' presentations.
