	The module aims to develop a professionally reflective competence that is historically, socio-politically, and culturally aware, and to utilize the knowledge conveyed in addressing current issues and problem areas in local, national, European, as well as transnational and international contexts.
	 Gain a comprehensive understanding of the historical development of social work, including its origins, key milestones, and influential figures in the field. Analyze the impact of social work within local, national, and transnational contexts, recognizing its evolving role in response to changing social and political landscapes. Develop a critical awareness of the challenges and opportunities associated with international social work and its relevance in the modern world. Examine the contributions of social work pioneers and their significance in shaping the profession and its methods in historical, intercultural, and global perspectives. Explore the premodern roots of social work and its evolution through different historical periods, with a focus on addressing poverty, industrialization, and social issues. Understand the role of organizations like the COS (Charity Organization Society) and settlements in the development of social work practices. Gain insight into the process of professionalization within the field of social work and its historical context. Analyze the history of social work within a European and international social work framework, considering its unique features and global relevance. Acquire a detailed overview of the historical development of



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social work in specific regions, such as Germany, Italy, and
South Tyrol.

Auflistung der behandelten Themen	Die Veranstaltung gibt einen Überblick über die Geschichte der Sozialarbeit von ihren vormodernen Vorläufern bis zur Gegenwart. Dabei werden sowohl der lokale und nationale Kontext als auch eine europäische (und internationale) Perspektive berücksichtigt. Besondere Betonung erfährt die sozialhistorische Gewordenheit der Sozialarbeit als Profession im Kontext gesellschaftlicher und sozialpolitischer Entwicklung. Vor diesem Hintergrund wird auf das Leben und Werk ausgewählter PionierInnen der Sozialarbeit eingegangen und deren Bedeutung für die Begründung von Traditionslinien in Professions- und Methodenentwicklung aufgezeigt.
