Course Contents	<p>The first part of this seminar offers an introduction to phonological theory at the PhD level. We will discuss the most relevant phonological structures at the segmental and suprasegmental level as well as their analysis in the light of modern theoretical approaches, especially Optimality Theory. In the second part of the seminar, we focus on some of the most recent developments in the domain of phonological theory, such as the analysis of phonological typologies with the analytical tools provided by property theory (Alber & Prince 2021).</p>

Learning Outcomes	<p>On successful completion of this module, PhD students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understand the theoretical and methodological basis of Conversation Analysis • demonstrate a deeper understanding of language use as ‘action’ in different types of social interaction • observe linguistic phenomena under the perspective of Conversation Analysis and Interactional Linguistics • make transcriptions of spoken, interactional data within a (multimodal) CA framework
Course Contents	<p>The course is an introduction to Conversation Analysis, an approach to the study of social interaction and language use rooted in ethnomethodology, based on naturalistic data (audio- and videorecordings and corresponding transcriptions) and aimed at describing the procedures used by social actors to produce and recognize interactional conduct. Students will be first introduced to basic concepts of CA related to the organization of face-to-face interaction (turn-taking, sequence organization and preference, repair) as well as to methodological principles of CA research. Differences between ordinary and institutional interaction will be then explored, together with the discussion – also from the perspective of CA-inspired Interactional Linguistics and with attention to multimodality – of selected topics such as for instance classroom interaction, openings and language negotiation, grammar in interaction etc. During the whole course, students will be engaged in individual and group data analysis exercises, while familiarizing with CA verbal and multimodal data transcriptions.</p>
