Course description	The course belongs to the class "di base" in both major in Design and in Art.  The module offers a survey of key episodes in the art of the 20th century – early 21st Century.  Adopting a global and transnational perspective, it examines artworks and artistic practices within the historical, cultural, socio-political, and environmental contexts of their conception, making and reception. In doing so, the module provides a repertoire of images and ideas that shall allow students to orientate themselves – chronologically, geographically and conceptually – in the artistic production and the history of the last century.

## Making judgements

## The assessment of the module consists of a written test **Assessment** and an oral examination. The written test includes the identification and analysis of up to eight works of art discussed during the module. For the oral examination, students are asked to present their personal art historical research on a work of art from the museum collections we shall visit during the module. **Assessment language** The same as the teaching language **Evaluation criteria and** Written test: The written test counts for 70% of the final criteria for awarding marks mark. Once the identification is correct, each answer will be assessed based on the completeness of the information provided, and on the structure and clarity of expression. Oral examination: The oral examination counts for 30% of the final mark. The presentations are evaluated based on the richness and accuracy of contents and clarity of expression.
