

Wolfgang Gick is a contract professor at the Free University of Bozen/Bolzano and an affiliated researcher in the Research Institute of Industrial Economics IFN in Stockholm. Gick grew up near Meran/Merano and graduated from “Beda Weber” high school, with a classical education in Greek, Latin and Philosophy. He is fluent in English, German, and Italian.

Gick received his PhD in Economics with highest honors from the University of Innsbruck in 1991 and started his career as an economic specialist at a Munich based academy from 1992-1997. In 1997 he started a first visiting scholarship at the Center for European Studies at Harvard university, followed by a senior appointment at the ifo Institute for economic research from 1998 to 1999, followed by tenure-track C1 position at the University of Jena, Germany from 2000 to 2001.

Gick was a Visiting Associate Professor in the Department of Economics at Dartmouth College from 2001 to 2007 while continuing his research in the Center for European Studies at Harvard until 2011. From 2010 to 2011 was a Visiting Associate Professor in the Department of Economics at the Georgia Institute of Technology (Georgia Tech). His teaching includes game theory, intermediate and advanced microeconomics, industrial organization, public economics, corporate finance, macroeconomics, regional economics and growth theory (PhD level). In 2012 he came to the Free University of Bozen/Bolzano as a Visiting Professor, subsequently teaching courses in economics, as well as at German universities such as FAU Erlangen Nuremberg, Augsburg, Bamberg and Magdeburg.

Gick is an outstanding teacher and became recipient of the campus-wide “Profiles in Excellence” teaching award at Dartmouth College and the “Best Teacher Award at the Free University of Bozen/Bolzano. Since 2015 he is an affiliated researcher with the IFN Research Institute of Industrial Economics in Stockholm.

His research is published in high-ranked refereed journals. His fields are industrial organization, mechanism design, contract theory, information disclosure, and signaling games. Recent research activities focus on public procurement, management and financial disclosure. Gick regularly presents his work at international meetings of the Econometric Society, EEA, the Game Theory Society and to department seminars.
